From the Chairman

How will Coronavirus affect conservation?

The economy has been severely affected by Covid-19. Income from tourism has diminished largely because of travel restrictions. When the overall budget of a country decreases, allocations for conversation funding – which may not be perceived as essential by policymakers – may drop consequently.

Moreover, by drawing a parallel with past financial crises, expect a reduction of donor funding for conservation for the next couple of years.

With the reduction of conservation funding, conservation operations could be compromised. A reduced budget means fewer resources and people to look after protected areas. Conservation operations are also affected by lockdown policies that reduce or eliminate the ability of people to get to key conservation locations.

Threats to conservation are increasing. This increase is caused by the alteration of conservation operations but also by the increase in rural poverty caused by the Covid-19 crisis. Rural Africans living near protected areas may use the natural resources of these areas to address their own poverty.

This could result in a higher frequency of poaching, tree cutting, mining, consumption of bushmeat, etc. All these factors could lead to undesirable outcomes such as population declines and extinction of local species. Consumption of wild animals may also have the additional effect of increasing the risk of future pandemics.

Covid-19 is predominantly seen as a human health crisis, but its impact is wide-reaching. Conservation efforts are suffering, and this may persist in the long term. We must be prepared for these extra challenges. Resources must be made available and wildlife protection efforts redoubled.



Update: Chipembele Wildlife Education Trust

Conservation Education Outreach in Schools Programme, South Luangwa, Zambia

Despite the disruptions Covid-19 had on school closures, the conservation clubs are running well with lessons conducted including Fire Ecology and Wildlife of the Luangwa Valley.

The clubs came to a close at the end of the year with the presentation of the Conservation Club Pupil of the Year certificates and prizes to the top students in each club.

The learning experience was not limited to the classroom; school children had the opportunity to participate in field trips into the national park, which was a first for many.

During the trips they saw the incredible diversity of wildlife that the park offers, while learning more about it from our knowledgeable Conservation Education Manager.

Another outdoor activity we ran took place in October as part of our Nature Nights program, which is a two-night three-day program for 10 students in a group, with two groups completing the program over the course of a week.

The programme is designed like a school camp experience with many team-building challenges. We also focus heavily on wildlife, with nature studies of different species visiting water holes, guided bush walks as well as learning spoor ID and tracking. The students who were selected to participate had a fantastic time.

To get the club members engaged in some hands-on activities, there was a multi-club clean-up day held with the support of the Mentors at Chipembele with students from Mfuwe Primary and Mfuwe Day helping to clean up the rubbish along the road by the schools. It was very successful and the area looked much better afterwards.

Our Mobile Education Unit also continued to reach the more remote schools to hold conservation sessions run by our enthusiast and experienced Community Conservation Educators, including distributing copies of our Kalata for Kids Magazines which are very popular with the students. We are very grateful to PDC Inc and we would like to thank them for their ongoing kind support.













The Shinganda Story: Celebrating 20 Years' in Greater Kafue

It was a great honour and privilege to accept an invitation from John and Ange Lemon to share our Shinganda Story at a PDC Inc. fund-raising event in Perth in October 2021.

The event provided Shinganda Wildlife Wilderness with a great platform to showcase who we are and what we do for wildlife conservation in our sector of the Greater Kafue Ecosystem in Zambia.

We also demonstrated the importance of our ecological connectivity through to the Kafue National Park, while providing a backyard for African Painted Dogs from Kafue, which regularly use Shinganda as part of their living space.

Having initiated the Shinganda project back in October 2001, the timing was perfect as Shinganda celebrated 20 years of conservation commitment in the region, through patience, persistence, perseverance and hard work.

We are very grateful to PDC Inc. for the support provided to us over the past five years, which has enabled us to continue collaborating with other conservation and research practitioners, in conserving African Painted Dogs and other wildlife in the Greater Kafue. Meeting the New Chief

Shinganda Wildlife Wilderness previously reported on the sad passing of Chief Mushima Mubambe during 2020.

With the support of traditional leadership and local communities for wildlife conservation being crucial in delivering conservation outcomes in the Mushima Chiefdom, Shinganda was mindful of the importance of establishing and building a working relationship with the newly appointed Chief.

Neil MacDonald of Shinganda recently travelled to the Chief's Palace at Mushima, where he met the new Chief and discussed matters of importance to his village communities, as well as wildlife conservation within his chiefdom.

Shinganda remains very grateful to PDC Inc. for supporting conservation jobs in the Mushima Chiefdom, via employment of our Conservancy Scouts.

The flow-on effects of these jobs are very positive for local people, providing benefits to approximately 50 individuals. Beneficiaries include close relatives, as well as some extended family members within the community.

The Shinganda Scout jobs also form the very basis of our wildlife recovery effort, with protection provided by our anti-poaching patrols remaining part of core business.

From the initial meeting held at Mushima, it appears that the new Chief is happy with our general performance

and we look forward to enhancing and strengthening our relationship with the new Chief over the years to come.

News About Dogs on Shinganda

Our Shinganda Scouts continue to report sightings of African Painted Dogs, as well as signs of kills made by the dogs, comprising mainly impala, but also bushbuck.

A group of 10 dogs was observed near our Scouts' camp and there is some recent evidence which points to the fact that a group of 10-12 dogs is spending significant time in the area.

In February 2022, we were contacted by Anna Kusler and Caroline Sanguinetti of the Zambian Carnivore Programme in Kafue regarding Painted Dog observations on Shinganda.

ZCP had been provided with images of a group of 12 Painted Dogs which were sighted and photographed by a tourist from the main Kaoma-Kasempa road, opposite Shinganda.

From data and photographs gleaned by ZCP over the past few years, individual dogs identified as belonging to this particular pack (including members from a pack in Kafue National Park), have been positively identified as being previously photographed on Shinganda between November 2014 and January 2022.

The regularity with which this pack of dogs has been observed in the Shinganda area over the past few years strongly suggests that Shinganda Wildlife Wilderness



forms an important part of their home range in the region. These records provide confirmation of the significance of Shinganda's contribution to the long-term persistence and survival of the African Painted Dog meta-population in the Greater Kafue Ecosystem.

Shinganda Conservation Profile Raised

Allisdair MacDonald of Shinganda, being a professional member of the Game Rangers Association of Africa (Namibia Chapter) since 1981, became aware that Benson Kanyembo of Conservation South Luangwa holds the position of Chairman of the Game Ranger's Association of Africa, Zambia Chapter (GRAA).

After gaining Benson Kanyembo's support for potential admission, Neil MacDonald applied for GRAA membership, which was subsequently approved by the GRAA in September 2021, with Neil now being a proud professional member of the GRAA, Zambian Chapter.

We hope to provide Benson with support to build the capacity of GRAA in Zambia over the next few years.

Similarly, Shinganda decided to strengthen its wildlife security profile and capacity, by gaining improved official status, through appointment of Neil MacDonald as an Honorary Wildlife Police Officer (HWPO) in Zambia.

With the support of the Zambian Department of National Parks and Wildlife (DNPW) in Siavonga and a recommendation from Benson Kanyembo at Conservation South Luangwa, Neil applied for HWPO status through the DNPW structures in 2021.

In January 2022 we were pleased to gain confirmation of Neil's appointment as HWPO in the Zambia Gazette No. 81 of 2022.

This HWPO appointment will assist greatly in networking and collaboration on matters linked to wildlife security and anti-poaching on Shinganda and surrounds.

It is pleasing to note the informal conservation networking benefits that have arisen among PDC Inc.-supported projects in Zambia, such as between Shinganda and Conservation South Luangwa.

Branding of Shinganda as a Vulture Safe Zone

For some time, Shinganda has been in liaison with BirdWatch Zambia (BWZ), regarding collaboration opportunities to raise the importance of vulture conservation at a landscape level, particularly through awareness-raising. BWZ works with Endangered Wildlife Trust, South Africa, finding sites to promote vulture conservation in Zambia, through vulture capture, tagging and release activities. As such, BWZ conducted a site inspection on Shinganda in October 2021 to assess the area's suitability as a Vulture Safe Zone (VSZ).

We are very proud that BWZ has agreed to brand Shinganda Wildlife Wilderness as a VSZ, opening opportunities for Shinganda to expand conservation initiatives to conserve these special birds. BWZ has manufactured awareness-raising signage, which is scheduled to be erected on Shinganda later this year. We look forward to working with BirdWatch Zambia and we are keen to offer Shinganda as an official vulturetagging site through BWZ in the near future.

Thanks to PDC Inc. for your ongoing support in rendering Shinganda as a safe zone for all wildlife through our anti-poaching patrols. These patrols continue to limit the impacts of poaching, thereby protecting the important prey-base for carnivores, the carnivores themselves and lastly, but also importantly, the scavengers such as the highly mobile vulture species that roam the skies.



Endangered Wildlife Trust

Over the past few years PDC Inc. has supported the Wild Dog Range Expansion work of Cole du Plessis in South Africa through the initiatives of the Endangered Wildlife Trust.

Most recently we contributed to the construction of a world-class holding/rehabilitation facility which will be used to hold Painted Dogs prior to reintroduction, to assist with formation of new packs and also to treat injured animals if required.

Our Chairman, John Lemon, built the rehabilitation centre at Painted Dog Conservation, Zimbabwe, in 2002/2003, using his extensive knowledge of exhibit design and function.

Due to our fundraising efforts earlier in 2021, we were able to contribute to the building of a vet clinic at the facility, in addition of the provision of a vehicle, which was a great result.

In Australia, government support in some form has reached the majority of the population through Covid. Not so In Zim, Zambia, Namibia and much of Africa. Spread the goodwill and the money ... if you have any left!
